Five Million Dollar Gift Marks Start of Campaign

Philanthropists Maggie and Bill Kaplen, two of our Medical Center's most devoted supporters, have donated five million dollars toward our campaign to build a next-generation emergency care pavilion at Englewood Hospital and Medical Center.

President and Chief Executive Officer Douglas A. Duchak announced the gift on May 5 at a private reception in Alpine at the home of Lenora and John Klein. "Maggie and Bill's exceptionally generous gift is key to ensuring the future of outstanding emergency care for our patients for many years to come," he said. "The Kaplens' gift exemplifies the kind of giving that will make the new facility possible." The Kleins and Foundation Chairman Richard J. Kurtz hosted the stellar event, which was attended by 75 guests from the community and the Medical Center.

The evening also marked the official start of the Foundation's *Lifeline to Tomorrow—Our Campaign*

for an Emergency Care Pavilion, a capital campaign with a goal of \$35 million.

Maggie spoke about the couple's motivation for their exceptional generosity. "We are committed to Englewood, and we believe in it," said Maggie. The Kaplens expressed the hope that their gift will inspire many others to donate. "Private funds are essential to the success of the Campaign," explained Executive Vice President Margaret C. Bridge.

This is not the first time that the Kaplens have been a "lifeline" to superior patient care or exemplary givers. Both have supported Englewood Hospital for many years, as two of its most generous donors and through outstanding service in many capacities, including distinguished tenures as trustees. In 2004, they were the first recipients of the Touchstone Award, which was established in their honor. The prestigious award recognizes standard-bearers in philanthropy.

A Next Generation Emergency Care Pavilion

Excellence and Innovation Set the Standard

Englewood's all-new emergency care pavilion will be exemplary in design, layout, and functionality.

The 35,000 square foot facility, almost three times larger than the current Emergency Department, will include 40 private treatment rooms, numerous staff work stations, specialty rooms, a dedicated radiology and imaging center, and a spacious waiting area featuring amenities such as a children's play area, carefully engineered acoustics, and abundant natural light.

Located on Engle Street, the pavilion's walk-in entrance and waiting area will be just steps away from Englewood's main lobby, providing easy access to ample parking, the café, the gift shop,

the chaplain's office, and the Healing Garden. Patients arriving by ambulance will be accommodated at a separate entrance. An advanced communications system will link physicians and emergency service crews during transport, enabling the healthcare team to prepare for patients before they arrive.

A major highlight will be spacious, comfortable 11 x14 treatment rooms, which will be configured to allow for loved ones even when caregivers are present. Staff will treat patients with dramatically increased efficiency, thanks to features such as decentralized work stations, flexible treatment rooms, and sufficient space within

the department for state-of-the-art technology and essential supplies.

The new facility will replace the current Emergency Department, which was designed to accommodate a maximum of 20,000 patient visits per year when it was completed in 1976. More than 36,000 patient visits were recorded in 2006, and experts expect the demand for services to continue to escalate. Patients can experience long waiting times, a direct result of the large number of people who seek care, the size of the department, and

the limitations of the physical plant, which cannot be remodeled or expanded satisfactorily to meet current or future needs.
